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About ICAN



The International Campaign to Abolish Nuclear Weapons (ICAN) is a global campaign coalition working to mobilise people in all countries to inspire, persuade and pressure their governments to initiate and support negotiations for a treaty banning nuclear weapons. Since its founding in 2007, ICAN has grown exponentially and established itself as the leading global coalition of civil society organisations acting together to outlaw and eliminate nuclear weapons.

With more than 360 organisations in 93 countries, ICAN has successfully brought humanitarian, environmental, development, and aid organisations into the nuclear weapons discourse. The recent political developments in the humanitarian initiative are a clear indication that ICAN's work is providing space and opportunity for political movement on nuclear weapons. By challenging the acceptability of nuclear weapons through humanitarian focused constituencies, ICAN aims to strengthen the notion that nuclear weapons are inhumane and useless, not worthy of today's world.

Hello from the team

Welcome to Vienna and to the ICAN Civil Society Forum!

We are excited to be gathering in such numbers and welcome you among the hundreds of campaigners who are coming together from all over the world with a clear demand: a ban on nuclear weapons.

Since the Civil Society Forum in Oslo, we have seen a dramatic change in the way we now discuss nuclear weapons. The humanitarian initiative has changed the terms of the debate. While many forums discussing nuclear weapons have been deadlocked, we have taken a major step in having nuclear weapons recognized for what they really are: dangerous, indiscriminate and unacceptable.

More and more countries are coming on board with the idea that a new legal instrument is needed to put the era of nuclear weapons to an end. The role of civil society is essential now more than ever. But we can preserve future generations from the risk of another humanitarian catastrophe. We can honour the survivors and achieve, together, what is long overdue: **A prohibition of nuclear weapons.**

Over the next two days, we will have the opportunity to greet old friends and meet new fellow campaigners. But most importantly we'll have a chance to learn from each other, explore options, and get ready to demand action.

We are excited to see what we can accomplish together.

The Second International Conference on the Humanitarian Impact of Nuclear Weapons, held in Nayarit, concluded with an ambitious vision. The conference's Chair, Juan Manuel Gomez-Robledo, said that the discussions on the humanitarian impact of nuclear weapons should lead to the commitment of states and civil society to reach new international standards and norms, through a legally-binding instrument. Many states and civil society actors have endorsed this proposal, arguing that, in light of the humanitarian consequences, a ban treaty is the logical response to the threat posed by nuclear weapons. But what would the impact of a treaty banning nuclear weapons actually be? How would it relate to existing nuclear disarmament treaties, and what would happen if the nuclear-armed states refused to join the process?

The ATOM Project

This international campaign wants to raise awareness for the human and environmental devastation caused by nuclear testing. Karipbek Kuyukov, honorary Ambassador to The ATOM Project, anti-nuclear weapons activist and renowned artist, will present some of his artwork in the Science Café.

Christian Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament

Christian CND will feature an interactive ethics display, which will allow participants to work through an ethics analysis. Participants may also use this process as a starting point for broader discussions around ethics and campaigning.

International Law and Policy Institute

ILPI is working on global challenges with an approach based on the integration of law and social sciences, and on bridging the gap between academia and politics. It will feature a space dedicated to brainstorming and discuss current strategies and arguments supporting nuclear disarmament. Moreover it will also be seeking feedback from participants on what resources campaigners need most, and how ILPI can help support this work.

International Fellowship Reconciliation Austria

IFOR, an NGO founded in 1914 in response to the horrors of war, counting 72 branches in 48 countries all over the world, promotes non-violence, human rights and reconciliation through public education efforts, training programmes and campaigns. Its Austrian branch, IFOR Austria will feature an interactive stall where participants can engage in non-violence exercises, view short film clips, and receive other resources on nonviolent action. This stall will also allow participants to engage in discussions around future campaigning action.

IPPNW Austria

IPPNW is a non-partisan federation of national medical groups in 62 countries, representing doctors and other health workers, medical students, and concerned citizens who share the common goal of creating a world freed from the threat of nuclear annihilation. The IPPNW Austria stall will feature an exhibition on the humanitarian arguments supporting the abolition of nuclear weapons. Participants will also have the opportunity to share their motivations behind working for a nuclear-free world.

IPPNW Germany

The exhibition "Hibakusha Worldwide" was created by IPPNW doctors and medical students from all over the world and is dedicated to the victims of the nuclear age. It presents the places where people were affected by nuclear explosions, such as Hiroshima and Nagasaki, Nevada or Semipalatinsk, Lop Nor in China, Reggane in Algeria, Fangataufa in the Pacific or Maralinga in Australia.

Japan Council against Atomic and Hydrogen Bomb (Gensuikyo)

Founded on September 19, 1955, Gensuikyo is working for the prevention of nuclear war; a ban on nuclear weapons, and relief and solidarity with Hibashuka, the A-bomb sufferers, including the annual World Conference against A & H Bombs. Gesuikyo is going to hold an A-bomb exhibition, where the effects of the A-bomb will be presented and they will collect signatures for a total ban and the elimination of nuclear weapons.

Japan NGO Network for the Abolition of Nuclear Weapons

This stall will include presentations on the experiences of the Hiroshima and Nagasaki bombings under the theme "70th Anniversary of Atomic Bombings: a united voice for action from Hiroshima and Nagasaki". The participating NGOs (Hiroshima Alliance for Nuclear Weapons, Japan Association of Lawyers against Nuclear Arms, Japan Confederation of A- and

H-Bomb Sufferers Organizations) will share their experiences on best practices and the way forward for nuclear disarmament.

Mayors for Peace, Japan

This international organisation of cities is dedicated to the promotion of peace that was established in 1982 in Hiroshima, Japan. It will host an interactive display allowing participants to get more information on the activities of Mayors for Peace, and how they can get involved.

Mayors for Peace Vision 2020 Campaign

The 2020 Vision Campaign is the main means for advancing the agenda of Mayors for Peace - a nuclear-weapon-free world by the year 2020. It was initiated on a provisional basis by the Executive Cities of Mayors for Peace at their meeting in Manchester, UK, in October 2003. This stall will introduce you to the 2020 Vision Campaign and its various projects, including conferences and challenges to bring awareness to the urgent need to eliminate nuclear weapons.

Nuclear Age Peace Foundation

NAPF supports worldwide efforts to abolish nuclear weapons. It has consultative status to the United Nations Economic and Social Council and is recognised by the UN as a Peace Messenger Organization. This stall will feature a multimedia display focused on the Nuclear Zero lawsuits, including a short video, interactive speakers, and an opportunity to directly support the initiative.

Norwegian People's Aid and Norwegian People's Aid Solidarity Youth

Founded in 1939 to provide post-conflict reconstruction assistance and humanitarian relief during conflicts, it is now engaged in more than 33 countries in de-mining, humanitarian relief and promotion of democratisation. This stall will feature a photo exhibition displaying campaigners and their reasons for supporting nuclear weapons abolition. Participants will also have the opportunity to give their

own reasons, and sign a petition for nuclear abolition.

PAX, Business and Human Rights Conform and ICAN Germany

PAX is a Dutch NGO operating in Africa, Latin America, the Middle East and the Caucasus and focuses on peace, security and development. This stall will feature information on the Don't Bank on the Bomb campaign and provide participants with information and resources on how they can get involved.

Soka Gakkai International and Pax Christi International

SGI is a lay Buddhist movement linking more than 12 million people around the world. The organisation's aim is to contribute to peace, culture and education based on the philosophy and ideals of Nichiren Buddhism. Pax Christi International is a global Catholic peace movement and network that works to help establish peace, respect for human rights, justice and reconciliation in conflict-torn areas of the world. SGI and Pax Christi International will present materials and information on current awareness and nuclear abolition campaigns, as well as some interactive displays.

Vienna Center for Disarmament and Non-Proliferation

The VCDNP is an international non-governmental organization established on the initiative of the Austrian Foreign Ministry in 2010. It is operated by the James Martin Center for Non-proliferation Studies at the Monterey Institute of International Studies. The stall will feature resources and materials around disarmament education and provide participants with programme information on further training.

Wildfire

The Wildfire stall will offer a special exhibition in the "Weasel lounge" and participation in the "Weasel Challenge", an interactive activity where participants are invited to challenge the "nuclear deterrent".

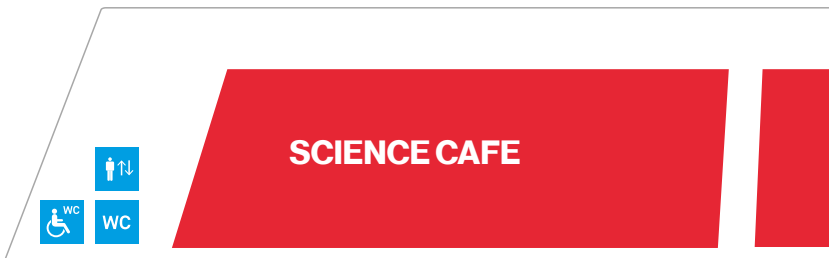
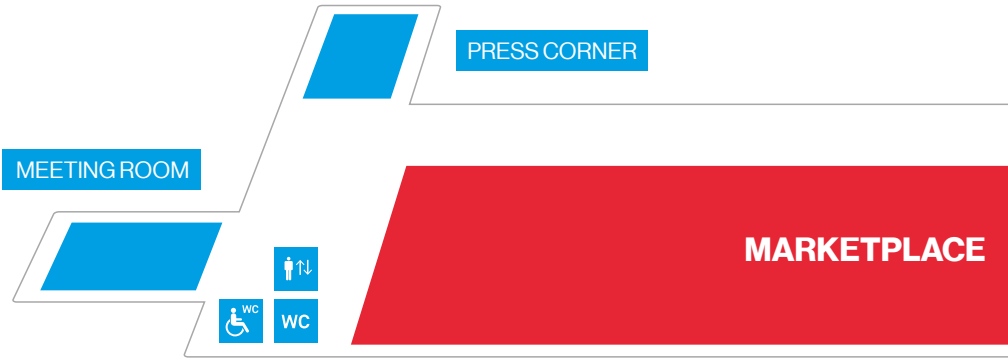
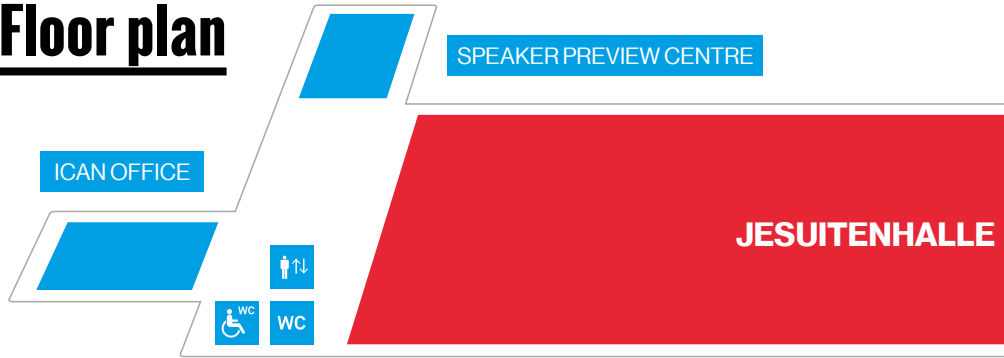
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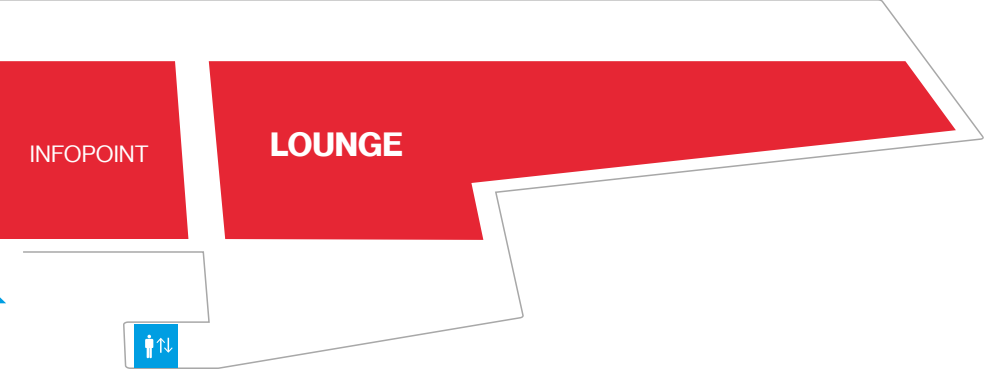
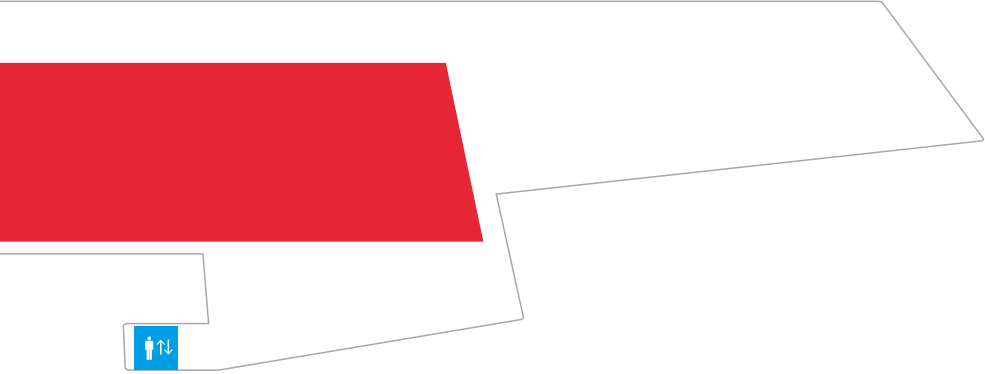
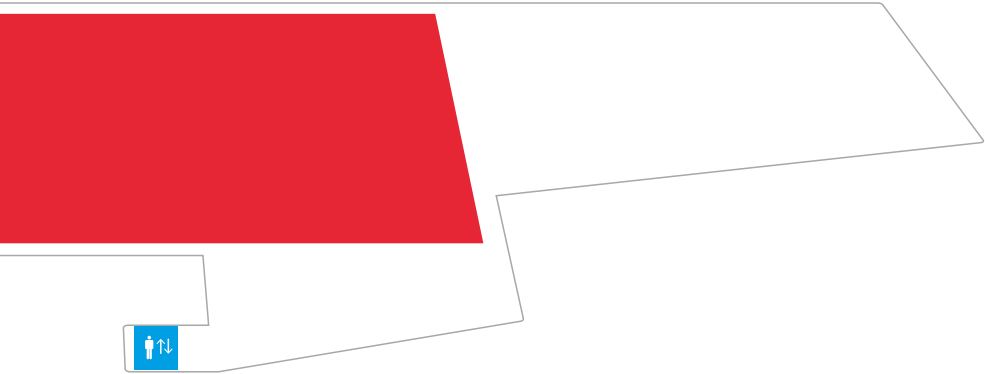
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Floor plan





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
